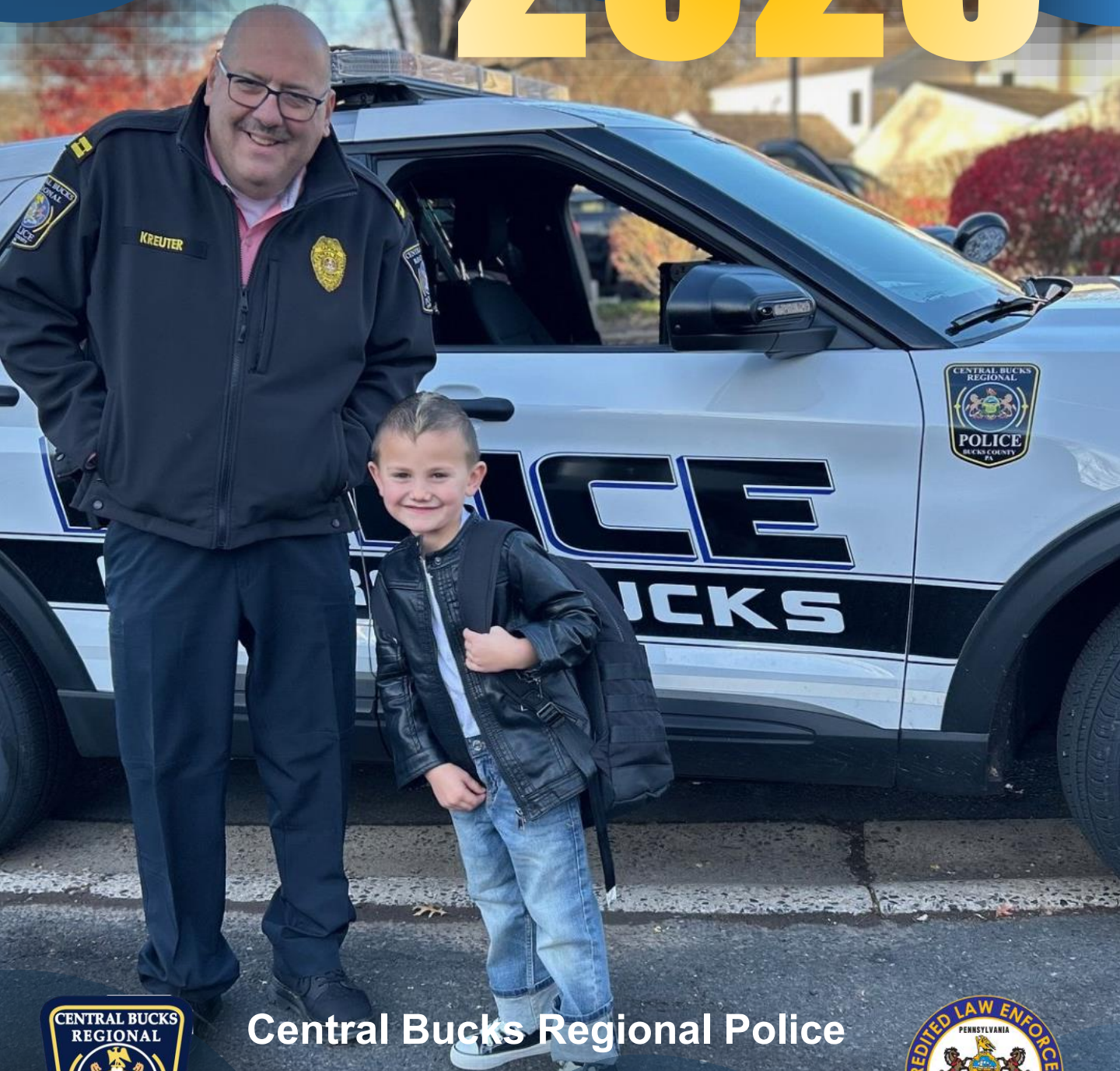

# MESSAGE

## FROM THE CHIEF



The 2025 Annual Report aims to enhance transparency, ensure accountability, and foster public awareness regarding the department's responsibilities in serving and safeguarding the community.

Our department is dedicated to protecting life and property, ensuring equitable law enforcement, and addressing the varied and often unpredictable challenges associated with public safety in a professional manner. We fulfill this responsibility with a commitment to integrity, accountability, and a deep respect for the individuals and communities we serve.

In this report, we explore the most pressing challenge this department continues to face which is an ongoing staffing shortage. Throughout 2025, I pivoted strategies several times to compensate for the shortages while not sacrificing public safety.

In 2025, there was a notable decline in incidents of theft, burglary, vandalism and public drunkenness. Conversely, the year also witnessed an uptick in assaults, weapons offenses, and disorderly conduct. Despite these mixed trends, the overall crime rate experienced a 2% reduction compared to 2024.

I appreciate the continued support of the Police Commission, the Borough Councils, and the residents of our communities. Together, we remain committed to providing professional, responsive and ethical law enforcement services.

# COMMAND STAFF



The Chief of Police serves as the department's top executive, responsible for setting strategic priorities, ensuring operational & fiscal efficiency, and maintaining public trust.

Command Staff represent the three highest ranking sworn personnel. Two Captains support the Chief of Police providing distinct responsibilities including leadership across all units to ensure departmental goals are met and effective resource allocation is delivered throughout the three municipalities.

Captain Lance Carlen commands the Patrol Unit, Traffic Safety Unit, K9 Unit and Live Scan Booking Center.



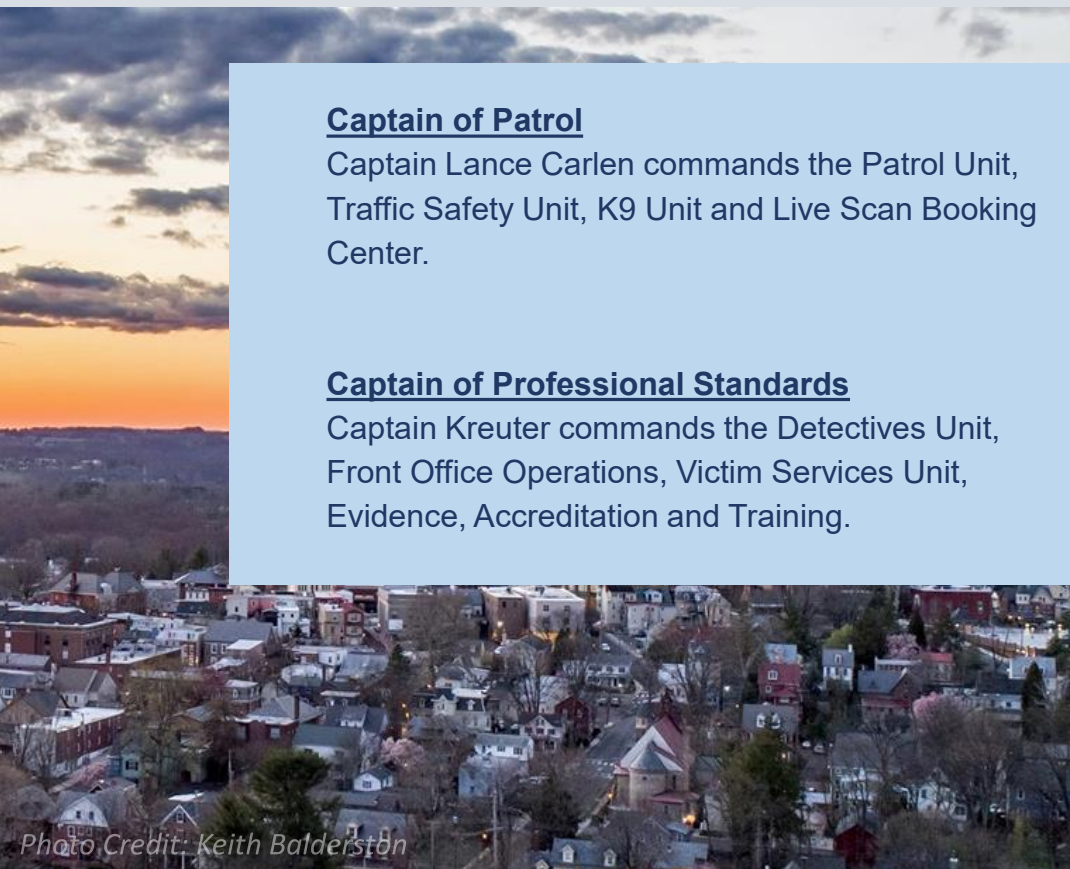

# TRAFFIC UNIT

The Traffic Unit is responsible for improving the safety of drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians in our jurisdiction. The Unit supports Patrol in responding to motor vehicle accidents and traffic enforcement details.

The Traffic Unit oversees all traffic crashes, conducts follow-up investigations on reportable accidents and operates/analyzes traffic studies throughout the three municipalities.

The Detective Unit's primary role is conducting criminal investigations such as deaths, robberies, burglaries, sexual assaults, thefts, arsons and white-collar crimes. In 2025, the Detectives worked on 197 cases. Detectives are assigned cases that are too lengthy and complex for patrol officers to handle. Depending on the complexity of the case, detectives can work on cases for months, even years, often traveling outside the jurisdiction in search of suspects and witnesses.

## ATTEMPTED MURDER Doylestown Borough July 2025

Detectives investigated a domestic assault incident following police dispatch for an abandoned 911 call. Officers first encountered Robin McNamara, the offender, outside the apartment and covered in blood but suffered no injury. The victim was found inside the apartment, covered in blood with gashes across the back of his neck among other injuries. McNamara had attacked the victim with a meat cleaver as the victim lay in the bed. Charges filed, court case pending.

## AGGRAVATED ASSAULT ABUSE OF CARE-DEPENDENT CHILD New Britain Borough October 2025

October 2025 – Detectives investigated an incident leading to the arrest of Dwayne Shepherd, Jr., a Foundations Behavioral Health staff member, who assaulted a juvenile, non-verbal patient. Shepherd pulled the calm care-dependent child from the couch of a common area and escorted him to a private room. A short time later, the child emerged from the room suffering from injuries Shepherd inflicted. Charges filed, court case pending.

# SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

CBRPD provides a full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) to the Central Bucks School District to enhance student safety, support school administration, and strengthen relationships between students and law enforcement. The SRO, Officer Jules Greco, is stationed at CB West and maintains a consistent on-campus presence during the school year, serving as a visible and approachable law enforcement resource. Her role extends beyond enforcement and includes prevention, education, and early intervention, helping to address issues before they escalate into safety concerns or criminal matters.

# K9 UNIT



Our K9 Unit is comprised of three canines and handlers: Officer Andrew Hochmuth and K9 Baron, Officer Greg Kutys and K9 Odie, and Officer Kyle Maloney and K9 Granite. All three canines are trained in patrol work and narcotics detection. The K9 Unit is often called upon to work high-risk operations outside of CBRPD's jurisdiction. The unit constantly trains and maintains annual certification.

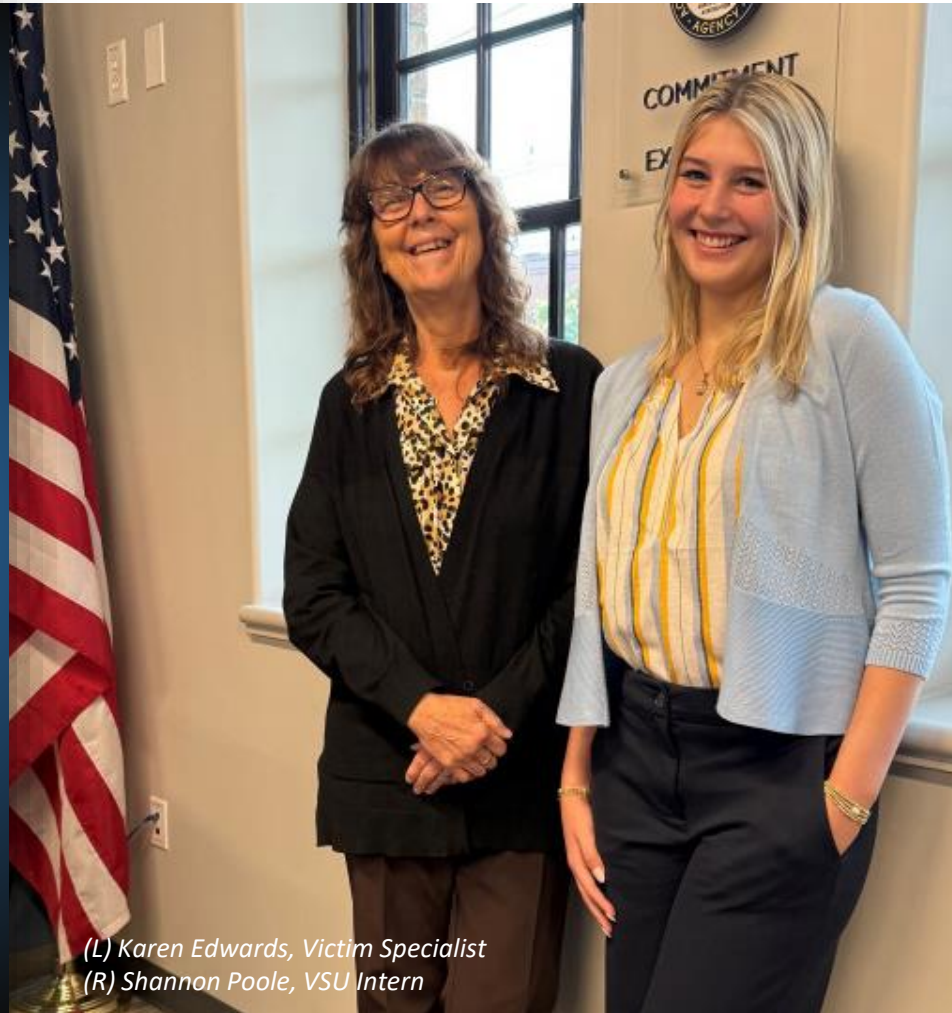

## USE OF FORCE

Our Use of Force policy requires that any use of force that is more than placing handcuffs on a compliant individual requires officers to complete a Use of Force report. This includes suspects of crime, as well as those in crisis who may be a danger to themselves or someone else.

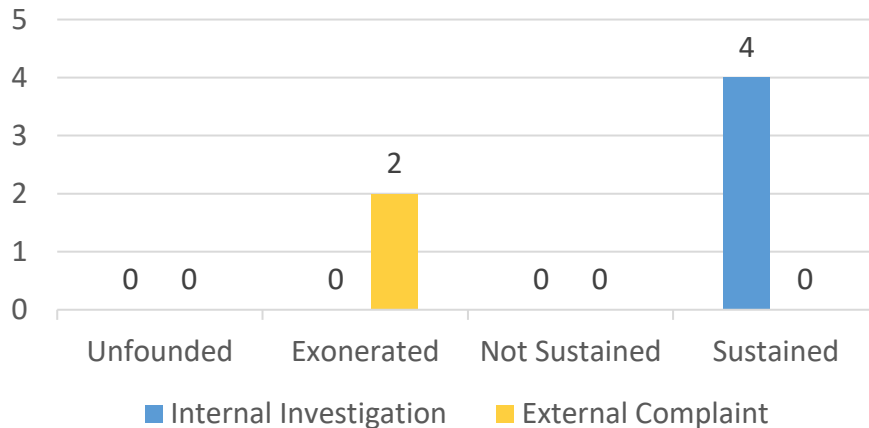

# STATISTICS

## INTERNAL REVIEW

Command Staff is dedicated to maintaining employee complaints and disciplinary records, ensuring a secure and reliable system. Complaints against department employees also go through investigation and review further bolstering confidence in the system.



In 2025, there were two complaints against police by the public. Both cases were exonerated following review of body-worn camera footage making police action lawful and not in violation of departmental policy.

There were four internal reviews with a sustained outcome resulting in disciplinary action. Disciplinary action can be anything from written reprimand, training, suspension or dismissal.

## Definition of Case Findings

**Unfounded:** The allegation was demonstrably false or there was no credible evidence to support the complaint.

**Exonerated:** The incident occurred but the individual's actions were lawful and did not violate written policy

**Not Sustained:** Investigation failed to disclose sufficient evidence to prove or disprove an allegation.

**Sustained:** The allegation is supported by sufficient evidence.

# STATISTICS

## CAMERAS

CBRPD deploys 29 body-worn cameras (BWC) and 17 in-car video systems. These are essential tools for law enforcement offering the following benefits: increased transparency and accountability, decreased complaints against officers, improved community-police relations, enhanced situational awareness, training opportunities, reduced liability, and evidence integrity.

### Activation

The in-car video systems are automatically activated to record when the vehicle's lights or sirens are activated.

The body-worn cameras are activated manually by officers during:

- Traffic stops
- Arrests
- Searches
- Interviews
- Calls for Service

The camera systems have the capability of redacting by-standers inadvertently captured on video.

CBRPD has been at the forefront of video technology instituting body-worn cameras in 2015. The first BWCs were WatchGuard just as they were being introduced to law enforcement. The department now deploys LensLock cameras. Using 4<sup>th</sup> generation cameras includes the latest technology for real-time, high-definition video with long battery life.

### LPRs

We have two License Plate Readers (LPRs) mounted on police vehicles. These are high speed, camera-based systems that automatically scan and capture thousands of plates per minute. License plates are compared against a "hot list" to identify stolen vehicles, wanted suspects, or missing persons, alerting officers in real time.

CBRPD currently operates a fleet of 20 vehicles. In 2025, vehicle lease payments totaled \$130,250, fuel costs \$64,008 and vehicle maintenance/repair \$65,650.

Patrol vehicles operate 24/7 and are quick to exceed the recommended service life and mileage limits. For this reason, we plan for vehicle replacement on a rolling 5-year capital plan. Rising fuel and maintenance costs place an increased financial burden on the budget.

# BIGGEST CHALLENGE

The most pressing challenge this department faces is an ongoing staffing shortage taking place over the past few years. This is due to a myriad of reasons which are overwhelmingly beyond the control of Command staff. A steady stream of overlapping staffing shortages was met with individual and collective strategies to circumvent a failure in public safety. This is an unsustainable scenario for the long term future.

## Staff Study

The Department was understaffed prior to the above absences. In 2022, the Police Commission hired SafeCity Solutions to conduct a Staff Study resulting in a recommendation to hire five additional Patrol Officers. The Police Commission approved hiring two additional patrol officers in 2023. Currently there is no formulated plan, both fiscally and administratively, to take actionable steps to reach the recommended police officer staffing level.

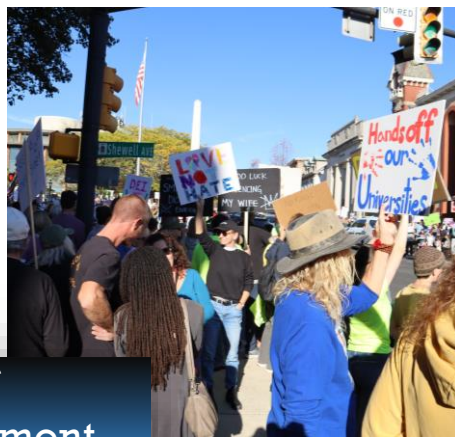

# EVENTS AND PROTESTS

CBRPD is tasked with providing public safety for large attendance events in Doylestown Borough, the County seat, and smaller scale events in Chalfont and New Britain Borough. In 2025, annual large-scale events including the Arts Festival, Memorial Day Parade, 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade, Dusk to Dawn Car Show, and various bike races and running events.

In addition to the planned events, there were numerous polarizing protests (President Trump, Elon Musk, ICE, Isreal, and Charlie Kirk). Protests continue to take place with little or no notice to the Department which taxes the already limited resources.



## Dynamics of Community Sentiment

The Department promotes proactive strategies aimed at ensuring both officer safety and community trust. Regular briefings on emerging trends equip officers with insight, guiding their interactions with the public during events that have the potential to spiral into violence. Each protest require Command to tailor protocols in police services.

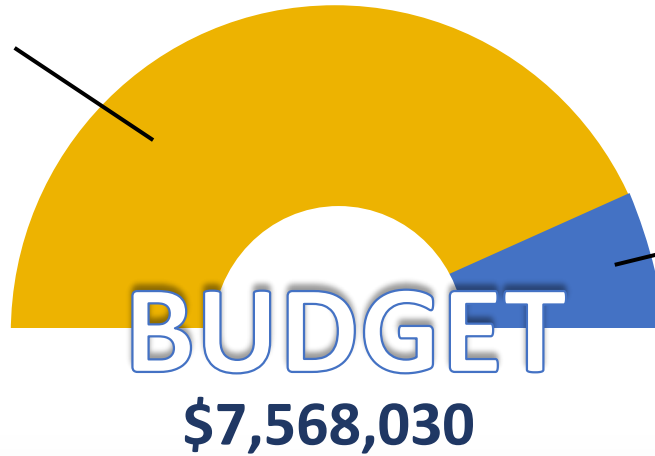

## New Policy

We no longer post names in the monthly arrest reports. This decision stems from our awareness of the significant repercussions that an arrest can have on an individual's personal and professional life, particularly when cases are not fully adjudicated. We believe that protecting the identities of those who are merely accused – until proven guilty – is essential in minimizing unnecessary stigma and fallout.

We make exception to this rule for any individual that poses a public safety risk, has an active Arrest Warrant or for investigative purposes as deemed appropriate by Command staff.

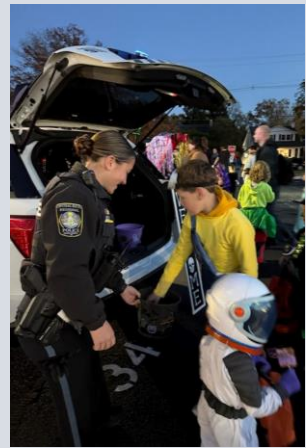
