Traffic Safety Reminders

While it may seem harmless, grass clippings can clog storm drains, infiltrate local waterways causing pollution, contribute to localized flooding, and create slippery conditions for

Property Taxes

Chalfont property owners receive two different property tax bills each year. The first is a County & Municipal Real Estate Tax Bill, which is mailed out to residents at the end of February. This tax is collected by Chalfont Borough. If you did not receive your bill, or you have recently moved, please contact Chalfont Borough's tax collector, Barbara Klingerman, at 215-822-7295.

If your property taxes are escrowed, **forward one portion of your bill to your mortgage company** and keep one portion for your own records.

County & Municipal Real Estate Tax Bill payments are made out to "Chalfont Borough." Each year, the discount period ends on April 30. The base payment amount is due by June 30. Payments made after that date will incur penalties. Payments can be sent by mail or dropped off in person to Chalfont Borough, 40 North Main St., Chalfont, PA 18914. The Borough's administration office is open from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday (closed on holidays). If you pay by mail and would like a stamped receipt, you will need to enclose a SASE with your payment along with the full tax bill, please do not separate at perforations.

School Tax Information

School Real Estate Tax bills are mailed to property owners around July 1st. If you do not receive that bill, or if you have questions regarding a school tax payment, please contact the **School Tax Collector, Nicole Percetti**, who works out of New Britain Township's office. Nicole can be reached by phone at 215-822-2930, or by email at: newbritaintax@gmail.com.

To take advantage of the discount each year, school tax payments have to be postmarked by August 31, otherwise the face amount is due by October 31. A small decorative icon resembling a stylized 'S' or a similar symbol, located at the end of the paragraph.

Chalfont's "Little Library"

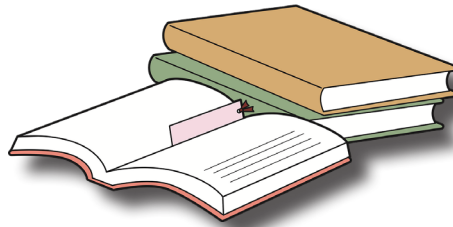
Lending a Little Joy



Chalfont resident, Pam Hamilton, would like to share that she has installed a little lending library in front of her property on Butler Avenue in the very walkable center of town. Pam became interested in these little hubs when she noticed them in communities around Portland, Oregon where they're also used for lending and sharing things like seeds, food, miniature art, puzzles and small toys. Doylestown, New Britain, Perkasie and Sellersville have also embraced "little libraries" where you can borrow books. A popular online group for these book lending hubs is littlefreelibrary.org where you can check out their map to find locations. There is also a local Facebook group dedicated to this endeavor, "Little Free Libraries of Doylestown & Beyond."

Central Bucks Regional Police News

DISTINGUISHED UNIT CITATION. Sergeant Jaclyn Riccio, Officer Andrew Hochmuth, Officer Zack Mason, Officer Alicia Belli, and Victim Specialist Karen Edwards received a Distinguished Unit Citation from Chief Karl Knott during the February Police Commission Meeting for their work in assisting a Doylestown Borough resident.

GRANT AWARDED. CBRPD was recently awarded a three-year \$425,560 grant from the Office for Victims of Crime for its collaborative multi-jurisdictional Victim Services Unit. Funds from this grant will increase the quality and quantity of services for the Boroughs of Doylestown, Chalfont and New Britain, and Buckingham Township crime victims.

RETIREMENT ANNOUNCEMENT. Chief Knott announced he will be retiring in January of 2027. A search for a new Police Chief is underway.

Seasonal Yard Care Tips

Help Prevent Stormwater Pollution

Chalfont Borough, along with other municipalities in the Commonwealth, is required by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to address stormwater issues using a variety of best management practices or BMPs. The Borough is required to implement BMPs to improve the water quality and reduce the volume of stormwater throughout the Borough. Here are some tips to help prevent stormwater pollution.

Plant a large stature tree...

Large trees are great stormwater control. They can intercept over 1,000 gallons of rainwater each year. Where possible, plant a large broad-leaf tree such as an oak, maple, or black gum.

Consider planting natural, warm seasonal grasses...

Native warm season grasses have extensive roots of 3 to 7 feet deep that enrich the soil and absorb many times the amount of rainwater that turf grass does. The grasses also help to filter out harmful nutrients which degrade our streams.

Get your soil tested before fertilizing...

Avoid applying too much fertilizer. Purchase a soil test kit from your local Penn State extension and submit soil samples from your lawn to determine the nutrients that may be lacking. Visit Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences website at <https://agsci.psu.edu/aasl> for more information.

Leave grass clippings for a free fertilizer alternative...

- Cut grass at 2½ to 3 inches tall. Mow often enough so that clippings are not longer than one-third (1/3) of the grass blade, so they can decompose easily into the soil.
- Spare your stream by avoiding spring fertilization and leave your grass clippings on your lawn instead. Grass clippings supply between 25% and 50% of nitrogen and phosphorus needs.

Native Milkweed: A Small Plant with a Big Impact

Across Southeastern Pennsylvania, gardeners and homeowners are discovering the powerful role that native milkweed plays in supporting local wildlife. Milkweed isn't just another wildflower, it's the only plant monarch butterfly caterpillars can eat, making it essential for the survival of these pollinators.

Several milkweed species are native to our region, including Common Milkweed (*Asclepias syriaca*), Swamp Milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*), and Butterflyweed (*Asclepias tuberosa*). There is also the uncommon Whorled Milkweed (*asclepias verticillata*), which has white flowers and likes drier soils. Each type produces beautiful blooms from soft pink to bright orange or white and provides nectar for bees, butterflies, and other beneficial insects throughout the summer. Many of the flowers are sweetly scented.

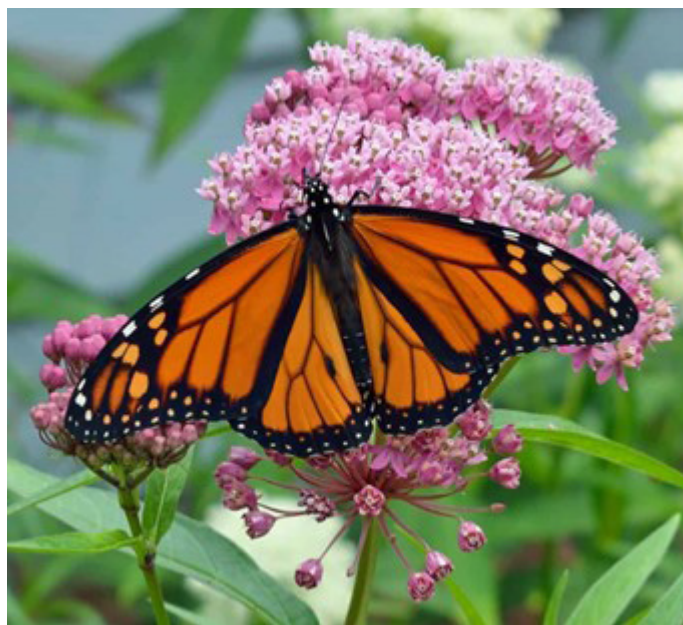
Monarch butterfly populations have declined significantly over the past few decades due to habitat loss, pesticide use, and reduced availability of milkweed along their migration route. By planting native milkweed in our yards, gardens, parks, and community spaces, residents can help restore this critical habitat.

Milkweed is easy to grow, thrives in sunny areas, and once established requires little maintenance. Even planting a few can make a meaningful difference for monarchs, birds, and other pollinators passing through our region.

There are several ways to get involved locally. Residents can find native milkweed and other native pollinator plants at the Chalfont Borough Native Plant Sale and Swap (May 9th in Krupp Park from 10AM to 12PM), or from local nurseries that sell natives. These plantings are a great opportunity to support pollinators while adding beautiful native species to your garden.

Community members also gather the first Saturday in April every year to clean up our watershed areas around Chalfont parks (thank you to this year's volunteers!). In late June, we hope to offer a Pollinator walk to list all the species we can find at Twin Streams Park. We will also be having upcoming spring birdwalks. Work continues on our three native plant gardens in the borough and volunteers are always welcome to join us. We also monitor 23 nest boxes and the Purple Martin gourd rack at Twin Streams Park. The Purple Martins usually return each May.

These efforts contribute to Chalfont's growing environmental leadership. The Borough was recently recognized with the **Bird Town Gold Award for Excellence**, highlighting our community's commitment to creating bird-friendly habitats and promoting native plantings.

By choosing native plants and supporting local conservation efforts, our community continues to build healthier habitats, one garden, park, and pollinator patch at a time.





Bird Town Chalfont Borough Receives Gold Certification Status

Bird Town Pennsylvania, a statewide program administered by the Pennsylvania Audubon Council, has awarded Chalfont Borough Bird Town **Gold Certification** status based on the activity of its program.

Each year, Bird Towns submit an annual report which is evaluated, based on suggested actions, to engage officials, students and residents of the community, and to improve habitat. There are five strategy areas where Bird Town leaders are encouraged to focus their efforts and attention:


- Municipal Actions
- Community and Individual Engagement
- Organizations, Collaborations and Partnerships
- School District and Youth-related Actions
- Advocacy and Promoting Awareness



As a result of Chalfont Borough's Bird Town completing actions in all five strategies, and achieving over 25 points, it received Gold Certification status! "It's not a competition between Bird Towns, rather a framework that provides a path of inspiration for doing more," said Heidi Shiver, President of Bird Town Pennsylvania. There are currently 102 Bird Towns in Pennsylvania most of which work with conservation partners such as Audubon chapters and land trusts. Color rankings are: green, bronze, silver, then gold.

Bird Towns, such as Chalfont's, create programs for people to learn about and experience the wonders of birds and nature, often in their very own backyard. Native plants and habitat enhancement play an important role in this experience and contribute to an improved ecological "footprint" that yields more birds and butterflies, and healthier places for people and pets. Congratulations, Chalfont Bird Town volunteers, for all of your efforts! We appreciate you.

DOG LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

In Bucks County, Pennsylvania, all dogs must be licensed at point of purchase or adoption (earliest is 8 weeks of age) or by 3 months if no transfer of ownership has occurred. All dogs that do not have a lifetime license must be licensed by January 1st of each year.

For 2026, an annual license is \$10.80, and a lifetime license is \$52.80. Discounts are available to older adults and people with disabilities. Dog Licenses can be obtained through the Bucks County Treasurer. Failure to obtain a license may result in a fine of up to \$500 plus court costs. 🐾
