

Chalfont Borough has certainly come along way from its humble beginnings. As early as the 1300's, the Leni-Lenape Indians arrived here in Bucks County. They sought refuge along the peaceful and plentiful shores of the Delaware River as they were pushed out from the valley of the Mississippi. The Lenape Indians were a quiet and friendly group led by Chief Tamanend, who was responsible for granting the treaty with William Penn, granting Penn all the lands "lying between Pennapecka and Nessaninechs Creek and all along Nessaninechs Creek" for as much wampum (strung beads used as money) and goods as William Penn might, agree to give him. William Penn also gave a grant to the "Free Society of Traders" in 1682 covering 20,000 acres. Land was sold from the tract in 1706, and four years later, Simon Butler and Simon Mathews, brothers-in-law, came from Wales and settled in Delaware County. In 1720, Simon Butler purchased 454 acres which included the present Borough of Chalfont, and acreage running south toward the boundary with Warrington Township. Simon Butler established a road, which was called at times, Butler Road, and other times, Whitehall Pike.



Simon Mathews purchased 283 acres, 127 of which joined Butler's land. The two men built a grist mill, which was repeatedly rebuilt after a series of fires. After Simon Butler died, his land was divided into smaller lots and sold. The small village, formerly known as Butler's Mill, went through a series of name changes through the years, rooted in each of the land owners' names. In the 1800's, a post office was approved in the name of Whitehallville for this area, so the village went by that name for a while. In 1869, the railroad changed the name from Whitehall to Chalfont. The tie to William Penn remains as Chalfont St. Giles, England, was where Penn met his wife, Gulielma.

In 1855, Forest, Park, an amusement, park, opened in the area. Originally known as "Eckhart's Grove," the park drew patrons from all over the Philadelphia area. It was highly popular and operated until 1968. The grounds are currently occupied by the Forest Park Water Treatment Plant.

In 1901, the Borough was incorporated after filing a formal petition to incorporate. Census figures in 1930 showed 55 residents in the Borough. Today, Chalfont has 14 road miles, approximately 4,000 residents, eight parks, and a volunteer fire department. The old Chalfont Bank, an A. Oscar Martin designed building, houses the present day municipal

office at 40 N. Main St.

## **TAX INFORMATION**

#### **COUNTY & BOROUGH MUNICIPAL TAX**

County and Borough Municipal Real Estate Tax bills have been mailed. If you have not received your bill, or you have recently moved, please contact Chalfont Borough's office at 215-822-7295 to update your mailing address. If your property taxes are escrowed, forward one portion of your bill to your mortgage company, and keep a portion for your own records. The discount period ends April 30<sup>th</sup>. The base amount is due by June 30<sup>th</sup>.

County and Borough tax payments can be sent by mail or dropped off in person to Chalfont Borough Hall, 40 North Main Street in Chalfont. The office is open from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday (closed on holidays). Masks are required upon entering the building, and please use the parking lot side entrance. If you pay your bill by mail and would like a receipt, please enclose a self addressed stamped envelope with your payment. Please make checks payable to "Chalfont Borough."

Your Earned Income Tax return is due by April 15<sup>th</sup>. You can e-file on Keystone Collections Group's secure website by going to: <a href="https://www.KeystoneCollects.com">www.KeystoneCollects.com</a>. Taxpayer support is also available on this site, or call Keystone's Taxpayer Helpline at: 1-866-539-1100 to speak with a local, knowledgeable Taxpayer Service Agent.

#### **SCHOOL TAX INFORMATION**

School Taxes are mailed to property owners on July 1st. If you do not receive them or have questions, please contact the School Tax Collector, Nicole Percetti, by phone at 215-822-2930, or by email at *newbritaintax@gmail.com*. Nicole accepts school property tax payments in three ways:

Or you can drop off your payment off in person at the 24-hour lock-box outside of Nicole's main office located at 207 Park Avenue in Chalfont (New Britain Township's administration office adjacent to North Branch Park). If you'd like a stamped receipt, include a SASE and the full copy of your bill. Please make school tax checks payable to: "Central Bucks School District," or just simply "CBSD."

To take advantage of the discount, payments must be postmarked by August 31st. Otherwise the base payment is due October 31st. &

**A:** The transformation of many of our Borough parks and trails has been incredible. It is great to see so many people running and walking through our beautiful parks.


**Q:** What long-range goals do you envision for Chalfont Borough?

## AN A. OSCAR MARTIN BUILDING

Chalfont Borough is home to five buildings designed by famed architect, A. Oscar Martin. One of these buildings is Chalfont's own Borough Hall located at 40 North Main Street.

After the Borough became incorporated in 1901, the first election was held on June 27, 1901, in the private home of John Weikman. The first council meeting was held at Hartzel's Hall where many items necessary for a new borough establishment were considered. In July 1905, A.E. Griffths volunteered to provide a chamber for council at 101 North Main Street, which Chalfont Borough would rent. This provided a home for Chalfont Borough council meetings for a number of years. Unfortunately, attending a meeting at this location required climbing steep steps to the second floor chamber room, and the need for accessibility for disabled persons to attend meetings required council to start looking for a more suitable meeting place. Under the leadership of Bea Barr in 1984, the old bank building at 40 North Main Street was selected.

A little eventful history about the bank, it was formed in 1925 with assets of \$50,000. On March 14, 1931, the bank was robbed. Three bandits entered the bank, while the fourth stayed in the get-away car. The four bandits managed to escape in the car with \$2,000. Cashier Hiram Bruner was the only employee in the



bank with a customer. Miss Annie Lovett, age 70, entered the bank at the time of the robbery and she was ordered to go to the office of President Russell Hartzel and remain there. When she walked in, according to her account, everything looked normal.

Kenneth Lane, who owned a garage near the bank, managed to note the license number of the car. The rear window of the car was smashed out as it passed Mr. Lane's garage. The bandits did that so they could shoot at the police. They

headed down Route 152 south and were eventually captured and sent to prison. If they had arrived at the bank any sooner that day, they would have gotten away with even more money because the employees of the Hosiery Mill in Chalfont came in to cash their checks that morning, depleting the bank's funds.

The bank remained at 40 N. Main Street until it moved to a different location on Butler Avenue. After the bank moved out, the building housed various other ventures including a library, an insurance agency, a police department, and a book store

that once held a book signing attended by James Michener. There is an early picture of the bank building hanging in Borough Hall, along with the bank's charter. The vault door at 40 North Main is still in its original position in the Borough meeting room.

As noted, Chalfont Borough Hall was designed by A. Oscar Martin. The Spruance Library in Doylestown holds the original plans and Chalfont Borough archives also contain a copy of those plans. The surrounding area, especially Doylestown, contains many buildings designed by Martin. Chalfont is fortunate to have five of them within its borders. A. Oscar Martin graduated from Doylestown High School and attended Drexel Institute. He designed residences, churches, office buildings and over 100 bridges. He was a registered engineer and was appointed director of construction and materials for Bucks County, staying in that position for 25 years. Despite his diversity in style, his buildings are almost always identified by their block shape, symmetry of detail, and use of masonry. Oscar's career lasted from 1873 until his death on February 4, 1942. His son, Fred F. Martin, pursued architecture and took over his father's firm in 1942. Fred designed an addition to the Lutheran Church in Chalfont.


Oscar left his mark on Bucks County by his contributions to local architecture. It is considered a plus if you own one of his uniquely designed buildings. The building at 40 North Main Street is one of many buildings in Chalfont's National Historic District.

# Spring Yard Clean-Up

A 30-yard dumpster will be available to residents for yard waste disposal ONLY. Acceptable materials include biodegradable-bagged grass clippings, brush, and limbs not exceeding 4-feet in length.

The dumpster will be located in the parking lot behind Borough Hall, 40 North Main St., on 5/13/21 until filled (~week).

#### **Dumpster Rules**

#### PLEASE NOTE:

- No plastic bags allowed in dumpsters.
- Do not fill over top of dumpster.
- Do not leave anything around the dumpster.
- No items other than yard waste allowed in dumpster.
- If your amount of yard waste does not fit, you must take it with you.

#### Chalfont Challenge 5K is going virtual for 2021

The first Chalfont Challenge 5K took place in June of 1992 celebrating Chalfont's June birthday. In 1996, the Chalfont Challenge joined with four other races to form the Bucks 5K Series. Following the 2001 Centennial celebration, the Chalfont Challenge 5K profits were used to develop Chalfont's parks and trails system. They have helped to construct trails, and to purchase Twin Streams Park. The most recent project was the work done to Chestnut Street Park. Funds from this year's Chalfont Challenge will go towards the construction of the northern Neshaminy Greenway Trail, which will connect Chestnut Street Park and Patriot Place's Open Space to the Lindenfield pedestrian bridge.

The 2021 Chalfont Challenge 5K is a virtual race. Registered runners may run a 5K course of their own anywhere or the new Chalfont 5K Trails Course. Chalfont is in the process of measuring and marking a 5K Trails Course in Twin Streams, Strong Family, and Michael Bishop Parks. This Course will be ready on or before May 1st. #### **Bucks 5K Series**


